Rosie, Butterfly Pavilion's Beloved Tarantula Ambassador, is Entering Her Next Chapter

Westminster, CO — **August 18, 2025** — Butterfly Pavilion today announced changes to its tarantula handling experience. These changes include Rosie the Chilean rose hair tarantula, Butterfly Pavilion's most beloved and recognizable ambassador animal, transitioning from public handling to a dedicated exhibit display. Beginning September 8, Rosie will transition from a public handling experience to a dedicated exhibit home, where she can continue inspiring visitors in comfort and safety.

Since 1995, Rosie has introduced millions of guests to the fascinating world of invertebrates, breaking down fears and misconceptions with each gentle encounter. Her transition from handling to a full-time exhibit role ensures her continued care and well-being while allowing guests to visit, observe, and celebrate her for years to come.

"Rosie has been the face of Butterfly Pavilion since our very first day," said Ryan Welch, President and CEO of Butterfly Pavilion. "She's changed how people see spiders, invertebrates, and the natural world. While we are phasing out her handling experience, Rosie will remain an enduring presence, inspiring new generations from her exhibit."

A Thoughtful Decision Grounded in Animal Welfare

As Rosie and her fellow ambassador tarantula, Goldie the Chaco golden knee, age, Butterfly Pavilion's expert animal care team has observed that public handling can create stress on the animals. After a comprehensive evaluation, the decision was made to conclude tarantula handling experiences to prioritize the animals' health and comfort.

Additionally, finding mature, handleable tarantulas has become increasingly challenging, prompting Butterfly Pavilion to evolve its guest experiences toward more sustainable, welfare-first interactions in line with the highest standards of care set by the Association of Zoos & Aquariums (AZA).

"The science around ambassador animal care has evolved, and Butterfly Pavilion is evolving with it" said Sara Stevens, Director of Animal Collections. "As our tarantulas age, current science tells us that reducing handling is key to their wellbeing. This transition reflects the highest standards in ambassador animal care."

"Rosie and Goldie aren't retiring from their roles as educators and advocates — they're simply trading the palm of your hand for thoughtfully designed spaces on exhibit where they can be observed and celebrated." Stevens added.

Rosie's transition marks a shift toward the future of invertebrate education and guest engagement. Butterfly Pavilion is developing new interpretive elements and guest experiences to share Rosie's story and the vital role invertebrates play in ecosystems worldwide.

"Rosie's transition isn't an end — it's a new beginning," Welch said. "She will continue to be a powerful ambassador, and we are committed to creating innovative experiences that connect people to nature in meaningful, magical and unexpected ways."
