Butterfly Pavilion Unveils Limited-Time "Spiders Around the World" Exhibition

September 26 – October 31, 2025

WESTMINSTER, COLO. (September 2, 2025) – This fall, Butterfly Pavilion invites guests to face their fears, fall in love with spiders, and celebrate Halloween in a whole new way. The limited-time exhibition Spiders Around the World runs September 26 – October 31, 2025, bringing magnificent arachnids from across the globe to take over the facility.

At the heart of the exhibition is Spider Zone, a breathtaking, walk-through enclosure where hundreds of orb-weaving spiders spin their intricate webs all around you—no glass, no barriers, just you, and them!

This year, the thrills don't stop there. Butterfly Pavilion's Bug-A-Boo Trick-or-Treating event returns as a highlight of the season, inviting families to enjoy safe, indoor Halloween fun surrounded by spiders, butterflies, and other fascinating invertebrates. Taking place during normal visiting hours on the last two weekends of October and special after-hours on Halloween evening, Bug-A-Boo is included with general admission and has become a cherished tradition for kids of all ages and their families.

Butterfly Pavilion's Tarantula Ecological Research and Conservation Efforts

Beyond the allure of the exhibition, Butterfly Pavilion has been a global leader in tarantula research and conservation since 2010. Many tarantula species face threats from habitat destruction, climate change, and exploitation for the pet trade. Butterfly Pavilion works globally to protect these remarkable animals and, closer to home, collaborates with the Colorado Department of Transportation (CDOT) and U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service (FWS) to study and protect tarantulas during their annual "mate-gration" in southern Colorado.

"Spider care and welfare go far beyond our exhibits," said Rich Reading, Ph.D., Vice President of Science and Conservation at Butterfly Pavilion. "Through our breeding programs and global partnerships, we're helping to ensure tarantula species survive for future generations while giving guests a chance to better understand, respect, and protect these incredible animals."

By visiting *Spiders Around the World*, guests directly support these crucial conservation efforts while gaining a deeper appreciation for one of nature's most misunderstood creatures.
